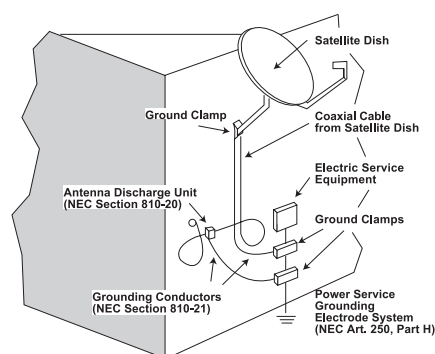
Do not block or cover slots and openings in the unit. These are provided for ventilation and protection from overheating. Never place the unit near or over a radiator or heat register. Do not place the unit in an enclosure such as a cabinet without proper ventilation. Do not mount equipment in the rack space directly above or below the unit.

Operate the unit using only the type of power source indicated on the marking label. Unplug the unit power cord by gripping the plug, not the cord.

The unit is equipped with a three-wire ground-type plug. This plug will fit only into a ground-type power outlet. If you are unable to insert the plug into the outlet, contact an electrician to replace the outlet. Do not defeat the safety purpose of the ground-type plug.

Route power supply cords so that they are not likely to be walked on or pinched by items placed upon or against them. Pay particular attention to cords at plugs, convenience receptacles, and the point where they exit from the unit.

Be sure that the outdoor components of the antenna system are grounded in accordance with local, federal, and National Electrical Code (NEC) requirements. Pay special attention to NEC Sections 810 and 820. See the example shown in the following diagram:



We strongly recommend using an outlet that contains surge suppression or ground fault protection. For added protection during a lightning storm, or when the unit is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet and disconnect the lines between the unit and the antenna. This will prevent damage caused by lightning or power line surges.

Do not locate the antenna near overhead power lines or other electric light or power circuits, or where it can fall into such power lines or circuits. When installing the antenna, take extreme care to avoid touching such power lines or circuits, as contact with them can be fatal.

Do not overload wall outlets or extension cords, as this can result in a risk of fire or electrical shock.

Never insert objects of any kind into the unit through openings, as the objects may touch dangerous voltage points or short out parts. This could cause fire or electrical shock.

## Section 2 — Product Summary

### 2.1 Revision History & Reason

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This is the first issue of this Instruction Manual.

### 2.2 Product Application & Description

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#### Application:

**SDE-6S-ASI (MPEG-2 SD Encoder/Multiplexer – 6xSD-SDI/6xNTSC – 2xASI/1xIP)** accepts up to six (6) standard-definition (SD) programs from any of the following inputs: 6xSD-SDI, and 6xNTSC. MPEG-2 encoded outputs are multiplexed into one Multi-Program Transport Stream (MPTS) which is available in the following formats simultaneously: 2x, and 1xIP (100/1000 Base-T).

The encoder supports Dolby® Digital audio encoding for (16) analog stereo audio pairs (L+R) which in addition to primary and secondary audio programs also provide a third audio pair for the Audio Descriptor Service, an additional narration track for blind and visually impaired, as mandated by the Twenty-First Century Communications and Video Accessibility Act of 2010 (CVAA).

Ad insertion SCTE 35 compliant queuing messages are detected for each program from either the audio Cue Tone input or a contact closure (operator selectable).

A baseband audio analog encoding capability table is provided in Section 2.3 (page 12) for easy reference. In addition to the baseband audio analog encoding capability audio programs that are already encoded and present on the SDI inputs may be multiplexed with the respective output (pass-through) without utilizing the baseband audio analog encoding resource.

The encoder also supports Closed Captioning (EIA-608, and EIA-708), and Emergency Alert System (EAS). A front-panel DVI port is available for real-time monitoring of active programs during operation.

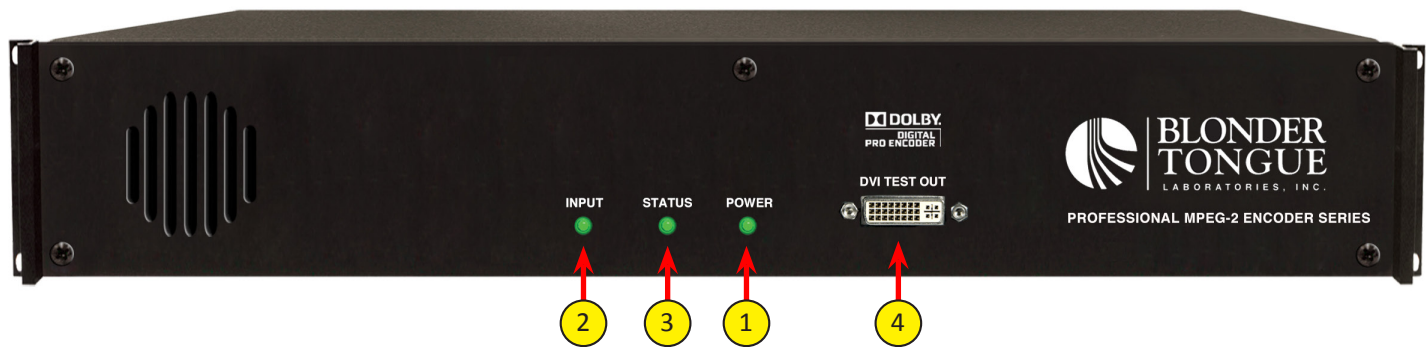
Comprehensive remote monitoring and control is accomplished using any standard Web browser via a rear-panel SFP port (10/100BaseT).

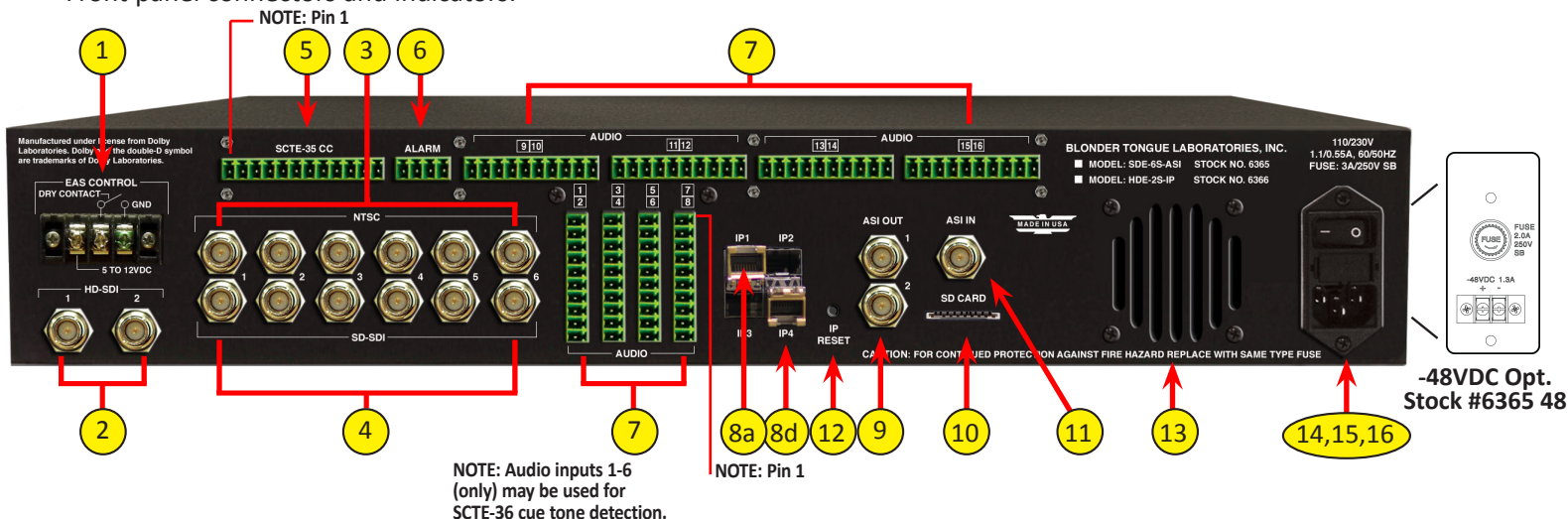

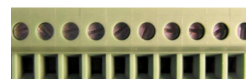

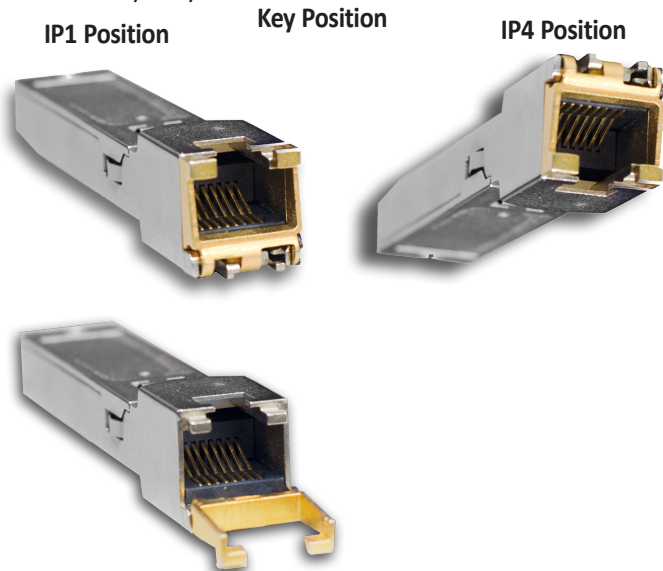

There are a total of sixteen (16) stereo analog audio encoding engines in the unit. The table above illustrates one example of how this resource may be utilized. In this example all the audio programs are provided as stereo baseband analog inputs. In this example none are provided by digital audio present on the SD-SDI inputs.

**Note 1:** In the example above, a third discrete Audio Encoder input will not be available for video inputs 5 and 6. However, the Secondary Audio for 5 and 6 can be used to provide the Video Descriptor Service instead of being used for a second language input.

**Note 2:** Detects ad insertion messages generated per SCTE 35 from multiple Cue Tone Audio inputs (user selectable).

## Section 3 – Installation & Power-up

### 3.1 Unpacking

---

You will find the following items in the box:

- SDE-6S-ASI-- Encoder (QTY=1)
- Power Cord with IEC C13 line socket and 3-pin Type B NEMA 5 plug (QTY=1)
- A hardware bag (item 741022200) containing the following:
  - Seven-foot cross-pinned (cross-over) RJ45 Ethernet cable (QTY=1)

  - 12 Pin Plug (QTY=1)
  - 10 Pin Plug (QTY=8)

### 3.2 Installation

---

The SDE-6S-ASI encoder is designed to be installed in a standard 19-inch (483 mm) rack (EIA 310-D, IEC 60297, and DIN 41494 SC48D).

To install the encoder, secure the unit's front panel to the rack by inserting four (4) machine screws, with cup washers, through the four (4) mounting holes in the front panel.



**For safe and reliable operation, the ground pin of the power cord plug must be grounded properly.**

### 3.3 Power-up

---

#### **110/230 VAC Encoders (Stk# 6365) :**

Connect the line cord to a 110/230 VAC, 60/50 Hz outlet. Please note that the IEC power connector on the rear panel of the unit is equipped with an ON/OFF switch and a fuse (SLO-BLO, 3.0 Amp, 250V). The "POWER" LED on the front-panel will light green.

#### **-48 VDC Encoders (Stk# 6365 48) :**

Connect the positive and negative leads from the batteries to the rear panel terminal strip.

## Section 4 – Communicating with the Unit

Local or remote communication with the unit is only possible through a GUI-based menu via any standard web browser. Before you can communicate with the unit, you must configure the unit's IP address to conform to your existing IP network or LAN. To do so, follow these steps:

- (1) Plug one end of the Ethernet cross cable that is provided in the hardware bag to unit's rear-panel RJ45 interface marked "IP1". Plug the other end of the cable to your computer.
- (2) The factory default IP address of the unit is 172.16.70.1. To be able to communicate with the unit, you must first change your computer's IP address.

The following steps explain how to do this for a computer with **Windows XP** operating software:

- (a) On your computer, open the "Control Panel"
- (b) Double-click on "Network Connections"

- 1 **TS Mapping: TS1** : indicates the top level transport stream name. The bold heading under Bitrates shows the actual overall bitrate over the prescribed bitrate (set in TS Config section, Section 5.XX)
- 2 **P1 (Program 1)**: indicates the PMT PID **48**, Transport Stream ID **(1)** (set in the TS Config section), the TS Short Name **()** (set in the TS Config section), the Major and Minor Channel numbers **(3-1)** (set in the TS Config section). See Section 5.8 for details on configuring the TS Config.
- 3 **Bitrate**: indicates the bitrate of the input program

In the section entitled “**Output**” under blue header, the following parameters about each program in output TS are displayed:

- 4 **IP**: indicates whether or not the IP Output is enabled. (See Section 5.9 for details).

**ENCODED VIDEO:**

- 1 **Maximum Format Size:** (480i) Indicates the resolution of the incoming video
- 2 **Video Source:** (6xNTSC, 6xSD/SDI, 2xHD/SDI) Indicates the video inputs source
- 3 **Video Input Signal Status:** this field will indicate whether the video is valid on the input.
- 4 **Detected Video Format:** this field will indicate what the incoming video format and resolution is.
- 5 **Detected Closed Captions:** this field will indicate whether or not there is Closed Captioning (EIA-608) embedded in the incoming stream.
- 6 **Video Smoothing Filter:** A two-dimensional low-pass filter controlling the degree with which the input video is filtered. Possible options are: Off (no filtering), On-Level 1, On-Level 2, On-Level 3, and On-Level 4 (highest filtering coefficient). Level 1 filtering of the video will smoothen the sharp edges of the pixels and produce a softer image. The softer an image, the less number of bits required to encode the image at the quantizer level.
- 7 **Encoding Mode:** Possible options are Frame, or Field. The factory default value is Frame.
- 8 **GOP Structure:** Indicates the frame structure for the GOP (Group of Pictures) in the MPEG stream. The options are I Frame (Intra-Frame or anchor frame) or IPPP (Intra-Frame plus Predictive frames).
- 9 **GOP Size:** The length between I-frames is known as the group of pictures (GOP) size. The factory default value is 15 i.e. 1 I-frame for every 14 non-I-frames. The range is 1 to 120.
- 10 **Video Bit Rate Control:** Indicates the ability to change incoming streams from VBR (Variable Bit Rate) to Stat-MUX. Stat-MUX is setting an upper limit on the outgoing stream bandwidth and fitting all 6 programs into that bandwidth.
- 11 **Video Bitrate Target:** This sets the upper limit target video bitrate for the outgoing video. Note that the total of all of the 6 streams must not exceed the total of the total TS Bitrate (set in the TS Config screen).

**PROGRAMS:**

- 1 **Virtual Channel Number:** (3-1) This is set in the Main/TS Config screen. The Major Channel is 3 and the Minor Channel is 1.
- 2 **Virtual Channel Name (short name):** Indicates the short name for the channel. This is set in the Main/TS Config screen.
- 3 **Encoded Video Channel:** Any one of 6 video channels can be assigned here.
- 4 **Encoded Audio Program 1:** Any one of 16 audio programs can be used here. This is set in the Main/Audio screen.
- 5 **Encoded Audio Program 2:** Any one of 16 audio programs can be used here. This is set in the Main/Audio screen.
- 6 **Encoded Audio Program 3:** Any one of 16 audio programs can be used here. This is set in the Main/Audio screen.
- 7 **Encoded Audio Program 4:** Any one of 16 audio programs can be used here. This is set in the Main/Audio screen.
- 8 **SCTE 35:** Displays the SCTE number (1 to 6) configured in Section 5.5 that is associated with this program.

## ENCODED AUDIO:

- 1 **Audio Signal Source:** Indicates the audio source program. This can be any one of 16 NTSC audio tracks, 6 SD/SDI embedded audio sources or 2 HD/SDI embedded audio sources.
- 2 **Left Channel Track:** This setting only applies to audio embedded in the incoming SD/SDI and HD/SDI streams. Any one of the embedded audios can be used here.
- 3 **Right Channel Track:** This setting only applies to audio embedded in the incoming SD/SDI and HD/SDI streams. Any one of the embedded audios can be used here.
- 4 **Audio Digitizer Sample Rate:** indicates the input sampling rate of the encoder. The SDE-6S-ASI supports 48 kHz sampling rate.
- 5 **Audio Delay (ms):** allows the user to adjust the audio delay (-300 to 300 ms) to correct for input video/audio sync mismatch.
- 6 **Dialog Normalization:** behaves as an Audio Automatic Gain Control (AGC) or Dynamic Range Control (DRC). It has the ability to take different incoming audio levels and normalize them. The ability of the Dialog Normalization depends on the configuration of the Dynamic Range Control. The SDE-6S-ASI allows you to adjust the normalization from -1 to -31 dB. The typical value is -27 dB. This is based on the standard film audio formats which normally are between -25 and -31 dB.
- 7 **Dolby Config Mode:** also referred to as Channel mode. Indicates the number of main audio channels within the encoded bitstream and also indicates the channel format. The unit supports 2/0:L,R= audio is a dual channel (Left & Right).
- 8 **Dolby Surround Mode:** indicates if the audio is two-channel Dolby or not. Possible options are:  
 Unspecified: indicates the decoder must determine the audio format by itself.  
 Disabled: indicates the audio is not encoded in surround mode.  
 Enabled: indicates the audio is encoded in surround mode.
- 9 **Dolby DRC Line Mode:** allows the user to select the type of Dynamic Range Compression to be applied to signals that will be used as direct audio feeds into a TV tuner or other receive devices. The factory default value is "None".
- 10 **Dolby DRC RF Mode:** allows the user to select the type of Dynamic Range Compression to be applied to signals that will be used for retransmission on an RF carrier, and then fed into TV tuner or other receive devices at the end of the line. The factory default value is "None".

Possible options for 9 and 10 are:

- a. **None:** no dynamic range controls have been assigned.
- b. **Film Standard:** suitable for movies where the very low-level sounds are not to be amplified due to other undesirable background noises that may become audible, but rather the peaks and valleys are normalized instead. It has a null bandwidth of 10 dB (-31 to -21 dB) and can add up to 6 dB of boost for low levels and attenuate high levels. The setting is used to quiet loud shouting and amplifier whispers. See Dolby Encoding guidelines for additional information.
- c. **Film Light:** is similar to "Film Standard" but with a null bandwidth of 20 dB (-41 to -21 dB) and can add up to 6 dB of boost for low levels and attenuate high levels.
- d. **Music Standard:** suitable for program content that is mainly made up of music where the sound level is to be normalized (reducing the loudness) to be consistent with other programs. It has a null bandwidth of 10 dB (-31 to -21 dB) and can add up to 12 dB of boost for low levels and attenuate high levels. See Dolby Encoding guidelines for additional information.
- e. **Music Light:** similar to "Music Standard" but with a null bandwidth of 20 dB (-41 to -21 dB) and can add up to 12 dB of boost for low levels and attenuate high levels.
- f. **Speech:** suitable for program content that is mainly made up of speech only and has a null bandwidth of 10 dB (-31 to -21 dB) for average speech and can add up to 15 dB of boost for low levels and attenuate high levels. The setting is used to quiet loud shouting and amplifier whispers. See Dolby Encoding guidelines for additional information.

- 11 **Default Audio Language:** Defines the language of the audio to be sent in the outgoing stream.
- 12 **Encoded Audio Bitrate:** Defines the outgoing audio bit rate.
- 13 **Encoded Audio Scaling Factor:** Default is 0 dB. Permits user adjustments of the encoded audio level.

**PROGRAMS:**

- 1 **Virtual Channel Number:** (3-1) This is set in the Main/TS Config screen. The Major Channel is 3 and the Minor Channel is 1.
- 2 **Virtual Channel Name (short name):** Indicates the short name for the channel. This set In the Main/TS Config screen. See Section 5.3 for details.
- 3 **Encoded Video Channel:** Displays the video input assigned to the program number in Section 5.3.
- 4 **Video Input Source:** Displays the video input source assigned to the program number in Section 5.3.
- 5 **Encoded Audio Program 1-4:** Any one of 16 audio programs can be assigned here. This is set in the Main/Audio screen.
- 6 **SCTE 35:** Displays the SCTE number (1 to 6) configured in Section 5.5 that is associated with this program.

- 1 **SCTE-35:** Enabled or disable are the options here. If there is an SCTE-35 feed coming to the encoder either through the contact closure feed or an audio channel this setting makes it happen.

- TS ID: user must enter the identification number for the output TS. The range is 1 to 65535. The TS ID assigned must be unique.

- 2 **TS Bitrate:** user must select bitrate for the TS. Possible options are:

- 1 **Destination IP:** allows user to assign the IP address of the equipment to which the IP output is streamed to.
- 2 **Encapsulation:** from the two available options (RTP & UDP) must select the one that matches the protocol used by the receiving equipment.

The following parameters can be modified:

- 1 **Login: is the Administrator's login (10 characters maximum):** This login allows the user to make changes to any area of the unit. The factory default Login is "Admin". Login is case sensitive.
- 2 **Current Password:** is the Administrator's Current Password (10 characters maximum). The factory default password is "pass". The password is case sensitive and will not be displayed.
- 3 **New Password:** used only if the user wants to change the current Administrator's password. Must enter a new password (10 characters maximum). Password is case sensitive and will not be displayed.
- 4 **Confirm New Password:** user must enter the same password as entered in 3 above. If password entered in 3 & 4 does not match, an error will be displayed.
- 5 **Guest Login: is the Guest login (10 characters maximum):** This login allows the user to view the unit settings but does not allow any changes. The factory default Guest Login is "Guest". Login is case sensitive.
- 6 **Current Guest Password:** is the current Guest Password (10 characters maximum). The factory default Guest password is "pass". The password is case sensitive and will not be displayed.
- 7 **New Guest Password:** used only if the user wants to change the current Guest password. Must enter a new password (10 characters maximum). Password is case sensitive and will not be displayed.
- 8 **Confirm Guest Password:** user must enter the same password as entered in 7 above. If password entered in 7 & 8 does not match, an error will be displayed.
- 9 **System Watchdog:** when Enabled, automatically reboots the unit, if the operating system stops working or the status LED turns status green or off. When disabled, manual reboot is required in case of above events. Possible options are enabled and disabled.
- 10 **System Reboot:** allows the user to remotely reboot the unit.
- 11 **SFP1 IP Address:** the control port factory default IP address is 172.16.70.1.
- 12 **SFP1 Subnet Mask:** is the Subnet Mask assigned to the Control Port of the unit. It allows the user to determine which subnet the Control Port IP address belongs to. The factory default Subnet Mask is 255.255.255.0.
- 13 **SFP 1 Default Gateway:** is the gateway address assigned to the Control Port. It allows the user to access the unit from another network via the web interface. The factory default Gateway is 172.16.70.254.
- 14 **SFP 4 IP Address:** is the static IP address assigned to the GigE port. The default address is 192.168.253.1.
- 15 **SFP 4 Subnet Mask:** is the Subnet Mask address assigned to the GigE port. Allows the user to determine which subnet the GigE IP address belongs to. The factory default Subnet Mask is 255.255.255.0.
- 16 **SFP 4 Default Gateway:** is the gateway address assigned to the GigE port. It allows the user to access the IP output of the unit from another network. The factory default is 192.168.253.254.
- 17 **Event Log Destination:** is the IP address of the remote server, to which Syslog sends the activities recorded by SDE-6S-ASI for monitoring and troubleshooting purposes. The factory default value is 172.16.70.2.
- 18 **Log Destination Port:** is the Event Log Destination port to which a duplicate of the error messages created by the unit can be forwarded for monitoring and troubleshooting purposes. The factory default value, which cannot be modified, is 514.
- 19 **Time Server IP:** is the IP address for the Time Server from where the unit can obtain its clock reference (See Section 5.8 for details). The factory default value is 172.16.70.2.
- 20 **Syslog Errors:** enable/disables the SDE-6S-ASI to forward error messages (in red font) to an SNMP syslog. The factory default value is disabled.
- 21 **Syslog Informational:** enable/disables the SDE-6S-ASI to forward information messages (in blue font) to an SNMP syslog. The factory default value is disabled.
- 22 **Syslog Feedback:** enable/disables the SDE-6S-ASI to forward feedback or confirmation messages (in green font) to an SNMP syslog. The factory default value is disabled.

### 5.13 "Time" Screen

The "Time" screen (Figure 5.13) allows you to set the current date and time for the SDE-6S-ASI. To remain compliant with ATSC and cable standards, it is important to have the accurate date and time stamps. For this reason, it is recommended to use the "Automatic" option which allows the unit to automatically acquire time settings from a "Time Server" - you must enter the IP address of the time server (see 19 of Section 5.12 for details).

- 1 In the section entitled "Time Adjustments", the local time zone on Coordinated Universal Time (UTC) can be set.
- 2 In the section entitled "Daylight Saving Time", the user can apply the Daylight Savings settings either manually or automatically using the DST Adjustment option.
- 3 In the section entitled "NTP Server", the user can enter the IP address of the NPT server to acquire the time directly from NTP Server when an internet connection is available (see 19 of Section 5.12 for details).
- 4 In the section entitled "Set Date & Time", the user can manually enter the date and time.

## 5.14 "Update" Screen

The "Update" screen (Figure 5.14) allows user to browse, select, and download/update the Config file.

- 1 **Choose File:** allows the user to select a desired configuration file to be uploaded to the unit from any location on the computer.
- 2 **Load & Apply Firmware Update:** Installs the configuration file selected in Choose File #1.
- 3 **Load Firmware Update From SD Card:** Installs the configuration file when placed loaded on to a SD card (not supplied) installed in slot located on the encoder's rear panel.

The upgrade process takes about 15 minutes. During this time the user may continuously click on the "Event Log" tab to view upgrading feedback.

The Event Log will show "System Update Complete" when done. The encoder now requires a reboot, that can be accomplished by using the power switch or through the hidden Admin page (see Section 5.12 #10 details).

After the reboot, verify the new software/firmware version by going to the Network page (see Section 5.11).

## 5.15 "Event Log" Screen

The "Event Log" screen (Figure 5.15) is a "read and write" screen where the following parameters can be displayed or configured. The data in Event Log can be forwarded to a SysLog database – (see 20, 21, & 22 of section 5.12 for details). The lines are color coded as follows:

- Red font = error message
- Blue font = information message
- Green font = confirmation or feedback message

#### A. THE EXTENDED WARRANTY AGREEMENT (EWA)

If during the period following the expiration of the Blonder Tongue Manufacturers' Standard Warranty (Copy Included) the products which constitute the subject matter of the extended warranty, manifest any manufacturing or similar such defects then Blonder Tongue shall at its option repair or replace the product. It is emphasized that the extended warranty is in effect an extension of the Blonder Tongue Warranty and covers the items stipulated in Paragraph B to the exclusion of the terms in Paragraph C of this agreement. Eligibility to purchase EW is limited to 90 days following initial shipment on selected products of sufficient value.

The product/products included in this extended warranty agreement are listed in the invoice that accompanies the EWA. Term of the extension will be \_\_\_\_\_ year(s). Purchase Order is required for extended warranty coverage.

#### B. WHAT IS COVERED?

1. If a product has been determined to have failed, which falls within the Terms & Conditions of this EWA, Blonder Tongue Inc. may at its sole discretion repair, modify or replace its component parts that are defective at 100% coverage for parts and labor.
2. A loaner unit may be available on request; PO required.
3. Product is manufactured by Blonder Tongue.
4. Extended warranty period is up to and not to exceed 24 months and sold in increments of 12 months. Order # 9981 for 1 year and #9982 for 2 year extensions.
5. Return of repair or replaced product shipping costs for ground shipments.
6. Firmware upgrades at no charge with automatic notification.

#### C. WHAT IS NOT COVERED?

1. The warranty does not cover any defects caused by foreign objects /connection errors .
2. Use other than by the customer at the declared address appearing in this document.
3. Failure by the end user to comply with the manufacturers' instructions for installation, maintenance or use.
4. The use of accessories which have not been approved by Blonder Tongue.
5. The application and/or use of any incorrect or abnormal electrical supply to the product.
6. Any defect in wiring or electrical connections which does not form part of the product at the time of the original purchase.
7. Neglect, misuse, or willful abuse of the product.
8. Any repairs or attempted repairs of the product by any person other than Blonder Tongue Service Department.
9. Any modification of the product by any person other than Blonder Tongue Service Department.
10. Fire, flood, war, civil disturbance, industrial action, acts of God or any other causes beyond the reasonable control of Blonder Tongue.
11. Any defect caused by lightning strike or power surges.
12. Shipping costs to return products to Blonder Tongue for warranty service.
13. Blonder Tongue will not in any circumstances be liable for any consequential loss or damages suffered by the customer whether directly or in directly related defect in the product to the extent permissible by law.
14. Repairs may not be effected without prior authorization from Blonder Tongue Laboratories.

#### D. GENERAL

1. The customer shall notify Blonder Tongue Laboratories in writing within ten days of any change of his or her address.
2. Customer must provide original **purchase receipt** and **serial number** to initiate extended warranty coverage.
3. The fee paid for the warranty is not refundable under any circumstances unless cancelled within seven days of purchase.
4. The customer shall take all reasonable precautions to maintain the product is maintained in good working order.
5. The warranty contract ceases to exist if the product is replaced or a credit is given to the customer. Any monies paid for the warranty contract are forfeited and not refundable. This is only applicable when the product is out of the manufacturer's warranty.
6. The extended warranty period as stated on the Extended Warranty Agreement shall be the governing period notwithstanding any additional supplier warranty on specific components.
7. The warranty shall in no way effect the terms and conditions of the sale agreement in terms of which the customer bought the product.
